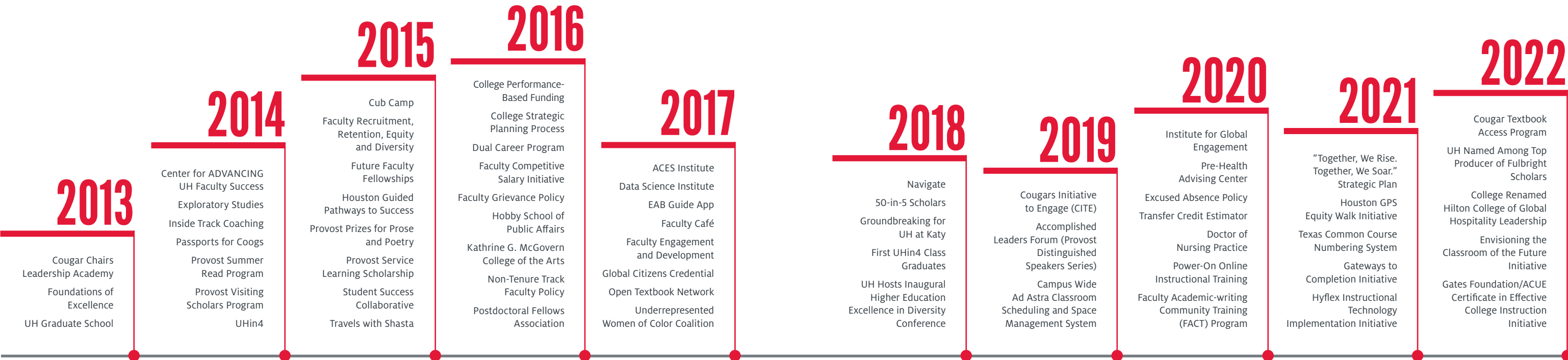

Working alongside the UH community, Provost Paula Myrick Short has worked to successfully launch new initiatives that support student success and faculty growth while complementing the university's strategic plan.



The Cougar Chairs Leadership Academy cultivates leadership talent on the UH campus, including sitting chairs and future departmental leaders.



The goal of the ADVANCE Center is to increase the number and success of women faculty in STEM and social/behavioral science fields.



Cub Camp is a first year program held the week before classes begin. New Coogs spend three days learning about UH traditions and the on-campus community.



The University of Houston leads the Houston GPS initiative in a collaborative partnership with four- and two-year institutions to close equity gaps in student success.



The Mariachi Pumas, part of the Kathrine G. McGovern College of the Arts, is the university's first collegiate mariachi band.



The 50-in-5 Faculty Celebration honors faculty achievement in patents, grants, publications, and national recognition.

For the six-year graduation rate, from 2013 to 2021, the equity gap between Black students and white students shrunk from 12 percentage points to 5 percentage points. The equity gap between Hispanic students and white students shrunk from 6 percentage points to 1 percentage point.

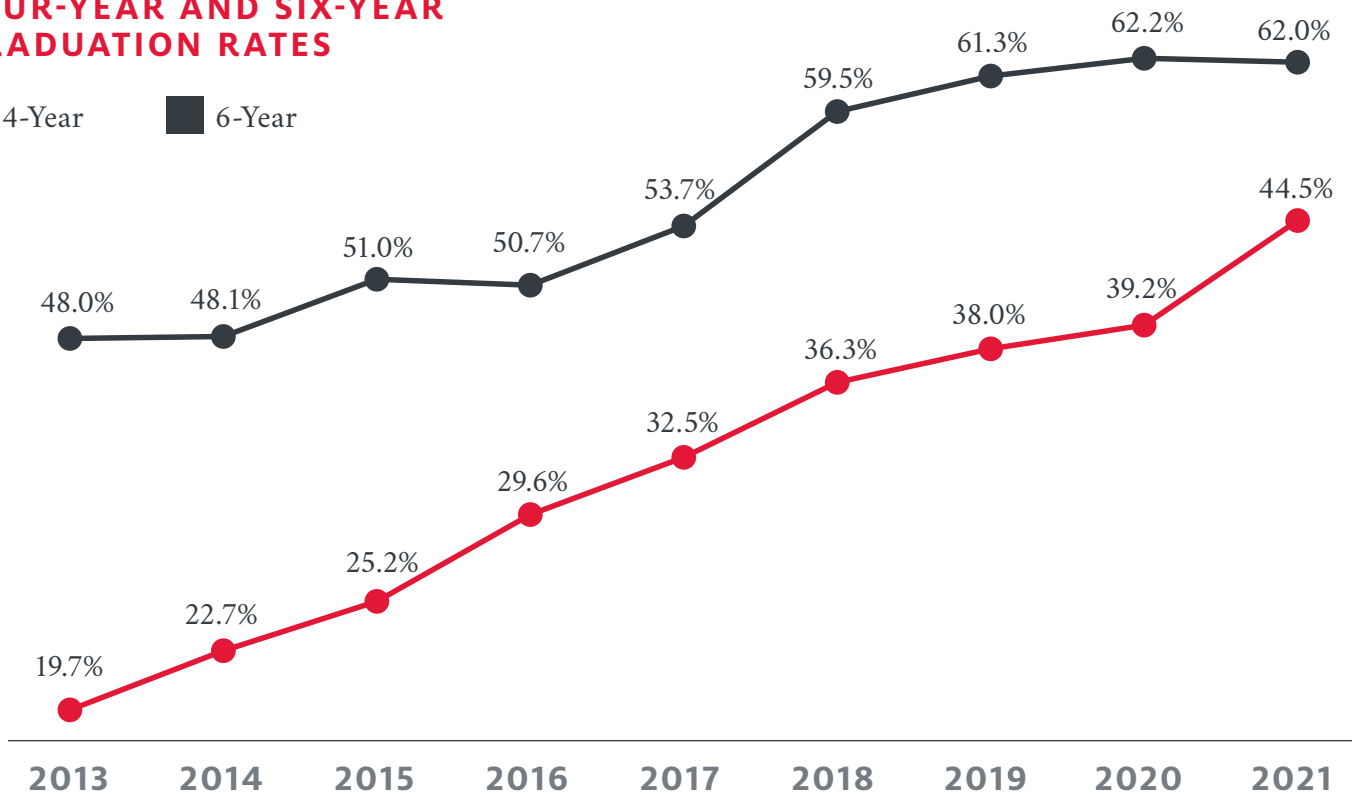

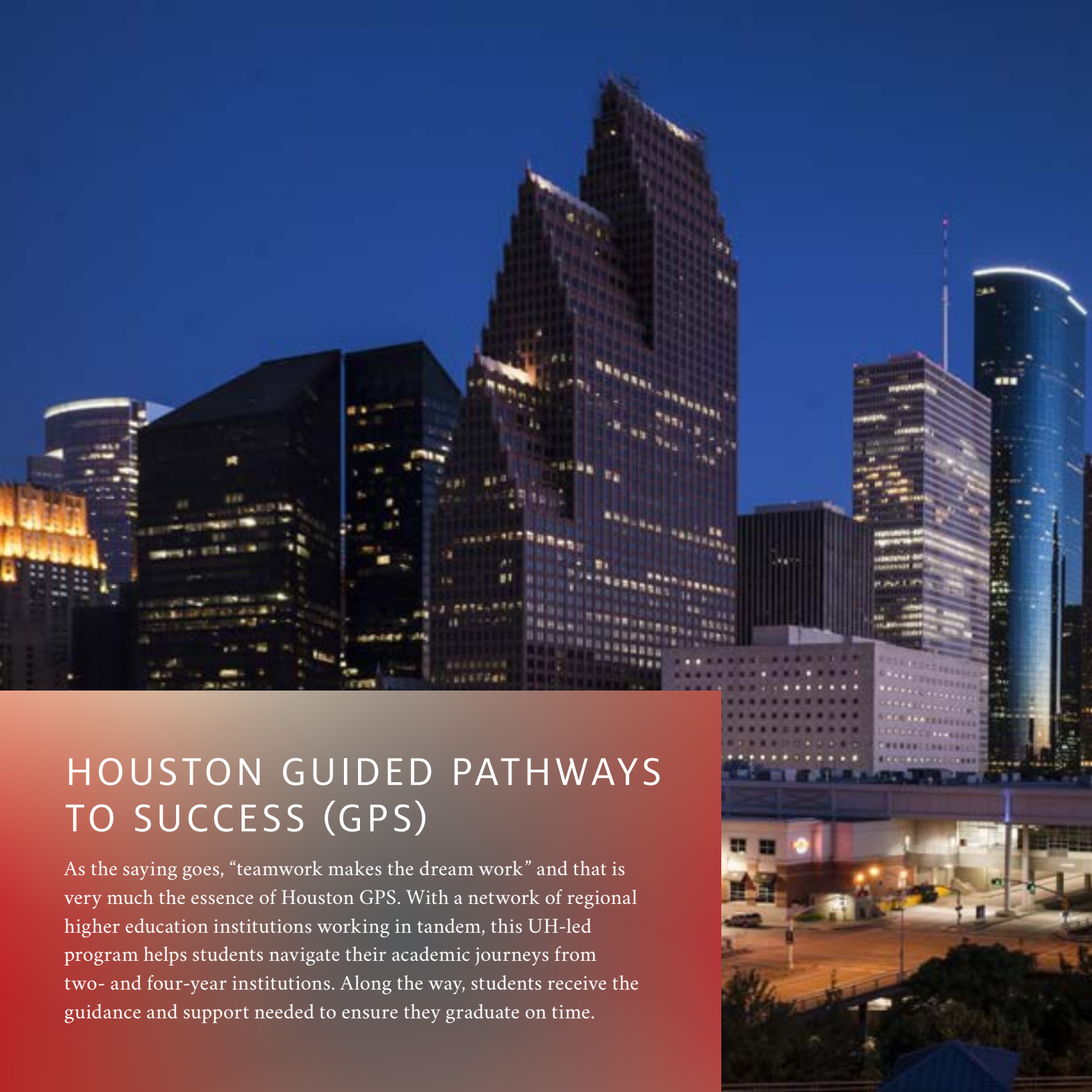

EQUITY WALK INITIATIVE

Houston GPS is addressing equity gaps that create barriers to success in the classroom and to graduating. With the support of \$900,000 in grants, the **Houston GPS Equity Walk Initiative** focuses on driving policy and practice changes to help close those gaps.

Grants provided by Greater Texas Foundation, Houston Endowment, The Kresge Foundation, The Powell Foundation, and Trellis Foundation are supporting 10 Houston GPS institutions in their efforts to improve success and completion rates for students from all walks of life.



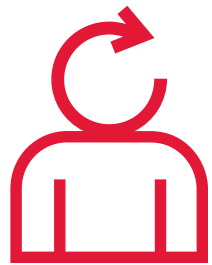
CUB CAMP

Cub Camp is a supplemental first-year transition program designed to bridge the gap between initial course enrollment and the beginning of the first fall semester. Students engage in purposeful activities that allow for a deeper understanding of UH culture and tradition, promote successful transition into college life, and identify and cultivate vital support systems.

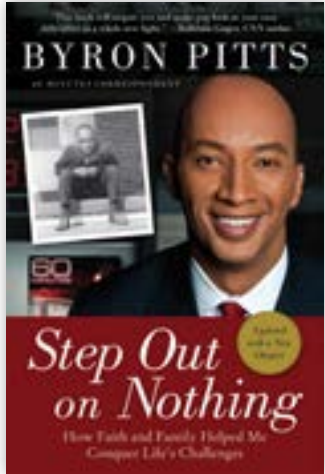

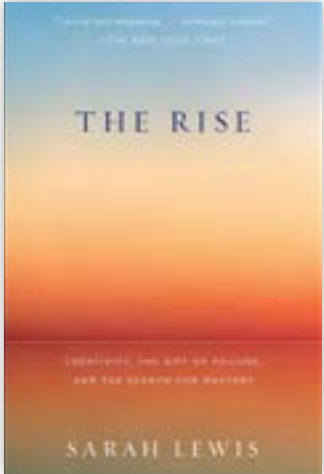


PROVOST SUMMER READ PROGRAM

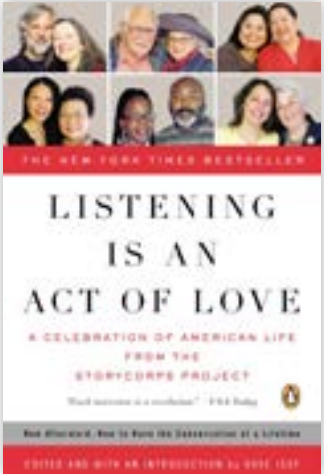

ONLINE AND HYBRID PROGRAMS

The University of Houston offers a wide variety of undergraduate, graduate, and certificate programs both online and through hybrid, session, and Weekend U options.

SPRING 2022 ONLINE/HYBRID COURSES ENROLLMENT

Most of UH's online enrollment consists of traditional students who are choosing online options to fit their schedules.

- 5,940 students are fully online, 56% of graduate students are taking at least one online or hybrid course, and 75% of undergraduates are taking at least one online or hybrid course.
- 840 graduate students and 4,000 undergraduate students are not in online degree programs but are fully online in Spring 2022.
- Spring 2022 Online Student Credit Hours (SCH) are 189,000, and Hybrid SCH are 34,000 (currently).
- Online and Hybrid SCH for FY22 are projected to be 530,000 SCH, with 16% Hybrid.

UH PREMINENCE: 50-IN-5

Each day, the University of Houston moves closer to its goal of becoming one of the nation's Top 50 public universities. That pace is accelerating thanks to a number of institutional achievements, but a key initiative in the institution's progress is **UH Preeminence: 50-in-5**.

Launched in 2018, the program seeks to increase UH's research and scholarly output by 50 percent over the course of five years. 50-in-5 is steered by the Office of the Provost and the Division of Research, and those who are helping move the needle for this initiative (and for UH) are **50-in-5 Scholars**—those faculty across the University who have earned major grant awards or patents, are published in high-impact journals and books, or received national awards.

These faculty members soon will be acknowledged via the **Scholars Walk**, an electronic campus art installation spotlighting their accomplishments.

HELPING ADVANCE FACULTY SUCCESS

As a Minority Serving Institution, UH's faculty mirrors its increasingly diverse student population. To ensure the success of its professoriate, the University has launched a number of initiatives made possible through the success of a \$3.3 million National Science Foundation ADVANCE Grant.

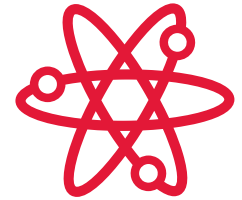
These funds were instrumental in launching the Center for ADVANCING Faculty Success, addressing professional growth for women faculty of color in both STEM and social and behavioral sciences disciplines.

This NSF grant has supported the development of the following offices—all aimed at ensuring an equitable campus environment:

- Office of Faculty Recruitment, Retention, Equity, and Diversity
- Office of Faculty Engagement and Development
- UH Postdoctoral Fellows Association

Additionally, the ADVANCE Grant has provided the University with resources to implement several support mechanisms for faculty such as training for faculty search committees; resources for back-up child and adult care; guaranteed UH Children's Learning Center locations for the children of recently hired faculty; and the Dual Career Program to assist spouses of new faculty in securing careers on campus or in the community.

The University of Houston’s academic reach extends throughout the city’s metro area through instructional sites offering in-demand bachelor’s and master’s programs. UH at Sugar Land and UH at Katy have expanded access to higher education within the region, and like the cities they serve, both sites continue to grow.

And through collaborations with the City of Sugar Land, Microsoft, the Texas Department of Transportation, and Wharton County Junior College, the future is certainly bright for communities and students in Sugar Land and Katy.

POWER OF PARTNERSHIPS

UH’s Cullen College of Engineering and Houston Community College-Katy are teaming up to offer the UH/HCC Engineering Academy at UH at Katy. This partnership will soon be bolstered by the arrival of a new HCC Katy campus directly across the street from UH at Katy.

SUPPORT FROM INDUSTRY AND COMMUNITY

Heavy Construction Systems Specialists, Inc. awarded a gift of \$2 million to the College of Technology to support new College of Technology infrastructure in its UH at Sugar Land building, as well as endowed scholarships. The College of Nursing received a \$3.5 million donation from HCA Houston Healthcare to benefit faculty, staff and students at UH at Sugar Land and UH at Katy.

WELCOME TO SUGAR LAND

In 2019, the College of Technology expanded its presence at UH at Sugar Land with the opening of state-of-the-art classrooms and labs. By 2025, the college will move all of its programs to the Sugar Land site providing community members with more degree offerings.

BECOMING A MAJOR GLOBAL INSTITUTION

Provost Paula Myrick Short leads the University’s efforts to be a globally recognized institution of higher education by infusing a comprehensive and systemic approach toward globalization within the colleges and centers. Major efforts have been made to integrate the global social, legal, economic, political, and technological dimensions across the curriculum.



GLOBAL FACULTY DEVELOPMENT FUND

The Global Faculty Development Fund was established to further faculty involvement in the globalization process of the University. Funded by Provost Short, the initiative was designed to increase both the assortment and quality of UH’s global programs by helping faculty to defray the costs of engaging in innovative global activities.

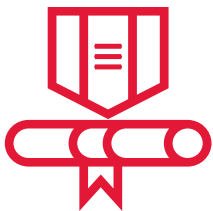

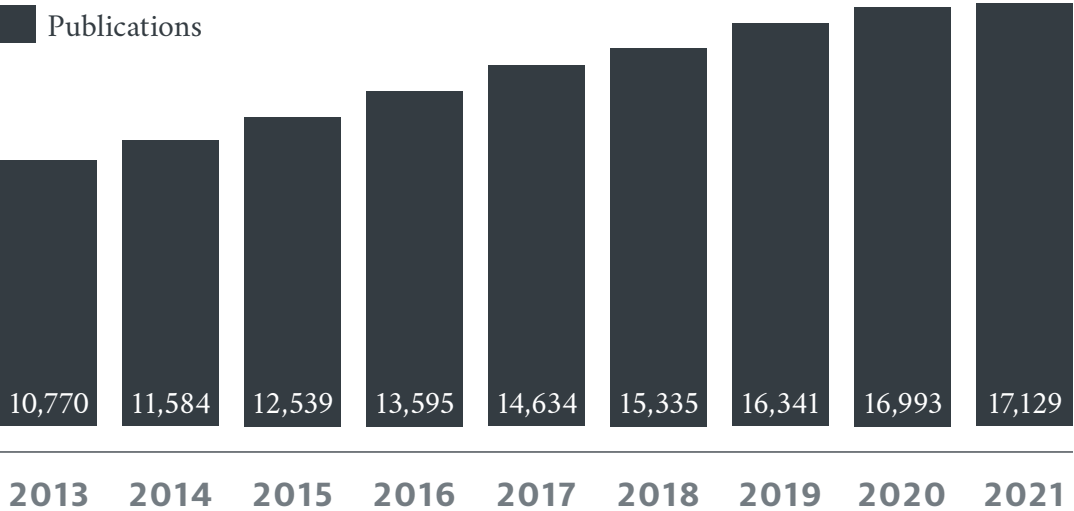

C.T. BAUER COLLEGE OF BUSINESS

The most comprehensive business school in Houston was built on the principle, “People are the product.” That was the motto of Ted Bauer, the namesake of UH’s C.T. Bauer College of Business. His words live on in the college’s commitment to producing professionals ready to elevate the region’s economy.

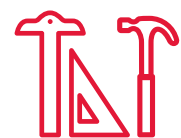

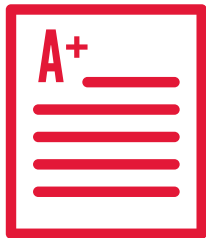
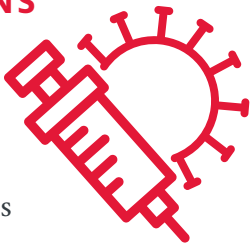
